

Since our last update, the Plant Protection Division (PPD) has remained vigilant and proactive in their efforts. They continued capturing worker hornets much later than expected, with the last one recorded on February 10, 2025. No additional hornets were captured until March 19, 2025, when they began detecting what they believe are emerging queens - 121 have been captured since then.

PPD has also received numerous reports of Yellow-Legged Hornet (YLH) nests. Four of these have been confirmed as YLH. We greatly appreciate the public's continued awareness and reporting efforts. We encourage everyone—especially those in Chatham County and surrounding areas—to report any suspected YLH sightings or nest activity by emailing us at <u>yellow.legged.hornet@agr.georgia.gov</u>.
