

Update by the Numbers:

New Traps Deployed (since January 1, 2025): 836
Total traps deployed (August 17, 2023 – October 8, 2025): 2,092
Hornets found (September 18, 2025 – October 8, 2025): 203
Nests found & eradicated (September 18, 2025 – October 8, 2025): 12 nests were found (10 have been eradicated, 2 will be eradicated shortly)
Total nests found & eradicated (August 2023 – October 8, 2025): 96 nests have been found (94 have been eradicated, 2 will be eradicated shortly)

- 2025: 4 embryo nests, 5 primary nests, 34 secondary nests
- 2024: 4 embryo nests, 3 primary nests, 41 secondary nests
 - Total: 48
- 2023: 5 secondary nests

Yellow-legged Hornet Eradication Efforts Continue in Georgia:

Over the past several weeks, the Plant Protection team has been actively tracking, trapping, and working to eradicate Yellow-legged Hornets (YLH). Now in their third year of managing this invasive pest, the team has successfully contained YLH activity to the Savannah, Georgia area.

We believe this success is due to a rigorous trapping program across Coastal Georgia, in-depth research into YLH behavior patterns, and close collaboration with partner agencies, universities, and neighboring states. Together, they are sharing data and strategies to combat the spread of this pest.





Recently, the team hosted the annual meeting of the Horticultural Inspection Society—Southern Chapter. During this event, they shared their progress and findings on tracking and eliminating the Yellow-legged Hornet from Georgia.

Between mid-September and now, the team has eradicated ten nests, with two more scheduled for removal later this week. They have also recorded over 200 hornets during this period. Since January, 836 traps have been deployed across the state.
